

Meet with a person whom you do not like; talk to them; meet your Samaritan woman


Pass through Samaria, through Jericho go to those on the other side; be open; Choose to disagree with civility











Prayer is whatever you do or say in a state of love, in a state of serenity, in a state of communion with the Father




























Pray constantly, unceasingly breathe in, breathe out the name of God.

PRAY, FAST, REPENT* AND REJOICE



Each year, this Lenten Season, you and I have its special meaning. It is a spiritual journey to one, a reconnection, a reconciliation, a painful memory of the passion of Christ or just Lent to others, kind of "going with the flow". We walk around on Ash Wednesday with a black mark on our forehead telling everyone who asks that Lent has started. It is forty days to pray, fast, repent, renew and rejoice in the Resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. People are oblivious to what we just said, either be-

cause of ignorance of the holy practice of Catholics or do not care at all. They say "aahh" and walk away.

The act of receiving ashes reminds us of our humility and mortality from Genesis 3:10 "You are dust, and to dust you shall return". While Christ has died for our sins, we are still human. Lent helps us to reach out, and concentrate on God instead of the worldly things and guilty pleasures that can lead us astray.

We say YES to Jesus when we pray, fast and repent. We deny ourselves and commit to His will. What do we give up as a sacrifice? Many habits and things: gambling, coffee, shopping, arguing, gossiping, meat to name a few. How about almsgiving – donating money, goods or food to the poor? *Alms are a worthy offering, a work of justice and charity that is pleasing to God. Do not hesitate to give alms. Give alms in proportion to what you own*. Give away excesses of your life. Be simple, but be generous.

Lately, we have been encouraged to deepen our knowledge by reading and understanding the scriptures, books on the charism of the Cursillo movement written by our founder, Eduardo Bonnin, and studying the Bible. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect. "Romans 12:2

Soon, the season will come to pass. BUT, *is your lamp lit?* Are you running out of oil while you wait? Are you prepared to meet your Lord and Master? Are you changing your wicked ways and be the man God created in HIS image? Loving and forgiving, are you? Take a good look at the man in the mirror; ponder upon the purpose of why is he here.

Rejoice and be glad! In HIS death and resurrection, WE ARE SAVED.

Pope Francis' Easter Message 'Urbí et Orbí' 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Happy Easter!

Today the Church renews the proclamation made by the first disciples: "Jesus is risen!" And from mouth to mouth, from heart to heart, there resounds a call to praise: "Alleluia, Alleluia!"



On this morning of Easter, the perennial youth of the Church and of humanity as a whole, I would like to address each of you in the opening words of my recent Apostolic Exhortation devoted especially to young people:

"Christ is alive! He is our hope, and in a wonderful way he brings youth to our world. Everything he touches becomes young, new, full of life. The very first words, then, that I would like to say to every young Christian are these: Christ is alive and he

wants you to be alive! He is in you, he is with you and he never abandons you. However far you may wander, he is always there, the Risen One. He calls you and he waits for you to return to him and start over again. When you feel you are growing old out of sorrow, resentment or fear, doubt or failure, he will always be there to restore your strength and your hope" (*Christus Vivit*, 1-2).

Dear brothers and sisters, this message is also addressed to every person in the world. The resurrection of Christ is the principle of new life for every man and every woman, for true renewal always begins from the heart, from the conscience. Yet Easter is also the beginning of the new world, set free from the slavery of sin and death: the world open at last to the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom of love, peace and fraternity.

Christ is alive and he remains with us. Risen, he shows us the light of his face, and he does not abandon all those experiencing hardship, pain and sorrow. May he, the Living One, be hope for the beloved Syrian people, victims of an ongoing conflict to which we risk becoming ever more resigned and even indifferent. Now is instead the time for a renewed commitment for a political solution able to respond to people's legitimate hopes for freedom, peace and justice, confront the humanitarian crisis and favour the secure re-entry of the homeless, along with all those who have taken refuge in neighbouring countries, especially Lebanon and Jordan.

Easter makes us keep our eyes fixed on the Middle East, torn by continuing divisions and tensions. May the Christians of the region patiently persevere in their witness to the Risen Lord and to the victory of life over death. I think in particular of the people of Yemen, especially the children, exhausted by hunger and war. May the light of Easter illumine all government leaders and peoples in the Middle East, beginning with Israelis and Palestinians, and spur them to alleviate such great suffering and to pursue a future of peace and stability.

The Pope's Easter Message - continued

May conflict and bloodshed cease in Libya, where defenceless people are once more dying in recent weeks and many families have been forced to abandon their homes. I urge the parties involved to choose dialogue over force and to avoid reopening wounds left by a decade of conflicts and political instability.

May the Living Christ grant his peace to the entire beloved African continent, still rife with social tensions, conflicts and at times violent forms of extremism that leave in their wake insecurity, destruction and death, especially in Burkina Faso, Mali, Niger, Nigeria and Cameroon. I think too of Sudan, presently experiencing a moment of political uncertainty; it is my hope that all voices will be heard, and that everyone will work to enable the country to find the freedom, development and well-being to which it has long aspired.

May the Risen Lord accompany the efforts of the civil and religious authorities of South Sudan, sustained by the fruits of the spiritual retreat held several days ago here in the Vatican. May a new page open in the history of that country, in which all political, social and religious components actively commit themselves to the pursuit of the common good and the reconciliation of the nation.

May this Easter bring comfort to the people of the eastern regions of Ukraine, who suffer from the continuing conflict. May the Lord encourage initiatives of humanitarian aid and those aimed at pursuing a lasting peace.

May the joy of the resurrection fill the hearts of those who on the American continent are experiencing the effects of difficult political and economic situations. I think in particular of the Venezuelan people, of all those who lack the minimal conditions for leading a dignified and secure life due to a crisis that endures and worsens. May the Lord grant that all those with political responsibilities may work to end social injustices, abuses and acts of violence, and take the concrete steps needed to heal divisions and offer the population the help they need.

May the Risen Lord shed his light on the efforts made in Nicaragua to find as rapidly as possible a peaceful negotiated solution for the benefit of the entire Nicaraguan people.

Before the many sufferings of our time, may the Lord of life not find us cold and indifferent. May he make us builders of bridges, not walls. May the One who gives us his peace end the roar of arms, both in areas of conflict and in our cities, and inspire the leaders of nations to work for an end to the arms race and the troubling spread of weaponry, especially in the economically more advanced countries. May the Risen Christ, who flung open the doors of the tomb, open our hearts to the needs of the disadvantaged, the vulnerable, the poor, the unemployed, the marginalized, and all those who knock at our door in search of bread, refuge, and the recognition of their dignity.

Dear brothers and sisters, Christ is alive! He is hope and youth for each of us and for the entire world. May we let ourselves be renewed by him! Happy Easter!





What Is Clergy Sexual Abuse?

Clergy sexual abuse occurs when sexual activity of any kind is enacted by a priest (or Deacon), thereby abusing the power and authority of the pastoral role committed to the priest (or Deacon) and violating the rights and dignity of the persons affected by such misconduct.

The fundamental dynamic at the heart of Clergy sexual abuse, is that of an <u>abuse of power.</u>

Together, hand in hand, we work as advocates for victims (survivors) to bring Support, Empowerment and Hope to lives - tragically altered by the debilitating legacy of Clergy sexual abuse.



No More Secrets Ministry

- Diocese of Oakland, through the Outreach Ministry to survivors of clergy sexual abuse, offers support groups to adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse.
- # No More Secrets Support Group is a mutual help support group providing an opportunity for personal sharing, prayerful reflection, and spiritual renewal.



No More Secrets Ministry

- Every even month (February, April, June, August, October, and December) groups are guided by a therapist with pastoral and clinical expertise.
- Focus is mutual support rather than therapy.
- Confidential meetings are open ended; new participants are welcome at any time.



CBCP Pastoral Statement

"Do not be conquered by evil, but conquer evil with good." Romans 12:21

Our dear People of God,

We thank Dcn Stan Lee for sending this pastoral statement to us cursillistas. When asked for permission to publish it, here Dcn. Stan's reply:

"Peace! The Church is universal because God is. What she expresses in a particular context reveals an aspect of her true identity: caring for all especially those who are suffering. The Philippines mirrors this so that the world might recognize God in the church who cares and never abandons. I believe publishing this pastoral statement is commendable and needs no permission."

Peace be with you. We are aware that many of you have been wondering why your bishops have kept a collective silence over many disturbing issues, about which you may have felt you urgently needed our spiritual and pastoral guidance. Forgive us for the length of time that it took us to find our collective voice. We too needed to be guided properly in prayer and discernment before we could guide you.

Responding with Silence

For the past few months now, we have observed how the culture of violence has gradually prevailed in our land. The recent bombing of the cathedral of Jolo where scores of people were killed and several more were injured is a further evidence to the cycle of hate that is destroying the moral fabric of our country. Lately, we have also been on the receiving end of cruel words that pierce into the soul of the Catholic Church like sharp daggers. From deep within, the body of Christ is crying out in anguish as he did to Saul of Tarsus on his way to Damascus. (Acts 9:4) We have silently noted these painful instances with deep sorrow and prayed over them. We have taken our cue from Pope Francis who tells us that in some instances, "...the best response is silence and prayer."

Faith: Our People's Source of Strength

We respect the freedom of conscience and religion of people of other faiths, including former Catholic Christians who may have already renounced their faith. We also respect the freedom of expression of our fellow citizens in this country, including their personal opinions about faith and religion. But as far as we know, the freedom of expression does not include a license to insult other people's faith, especially our core beliefs. We know that this cuts deeply into the souls of our people—especially the poor, because faith is the only thing they have to hold on to. It gives them hope and strength to continue living and working despite all the odds that come their way. It sustains them when they feel alone and defenseless in foreign lands where they work.

When people do not understand our essential doctrines as Roman Catholic Christians, we have also ourselves to blame. It could also mean we have failed in our preaching. Perhaps we have not been effective enough in our catechesis about the faith? Perhaps we should find better and more appropriate ways of communicating the faith. Our preparation for the celebration of the 500th year of Christianity in the Philippines could serve as a perfect opportunity to embark on a renewed integral evangelization in word and witness.

Admitting our Shortcomings

Like the leaders and members of any other human institution, no doubt, we, your bishops and priests have our own share of failures and shortcomings as well. We have already mentioned in our previous statement that "we bow in shame when we hear of abuses committed by some of (us)…", that "we hold ourselves accountable for their actions, and accept our duty to correct them…

Not Against Fighting Illegal Drugs

There are people who, perhaps out of concern for us, have warned us about being critical of the government's fight against illegal drugs. Perhaps we need to make ourselves clear about this issue. We are not against the government's efforts to fight illegal drugs. We do respect the fact that it is the government's duty to maintain law and order and to protect its citizens from lawless elements. We have long acknowledged that illegal drugs are a menace to society and that their easier victims are the poor. Like most other Filipinos we had high hopes that the government would truly flex some political will to be able to use the full force of the law in working against this terrible menace. It was when we started hearing of mostly poor people being brutally murdered on mere suspicion of being small-time drug users and peddlers while the big-time smugglers and drug lords went scotfree, that we started wondering about the direction this "drug war" was taking.

As bishops, we have no intention of interfering in the conduct of State affairs. But neither do we intend to abdicate our sacred mandate as shepherds to whom the Lord has entrusted his flock. We have a solemn duty to defend our flock, especially when they are attacked by wolves(!) We do not fight with arms. We fight only with the truth. Therefore, no amount of intimidation or even threat to our lives will make us give up our prophetic role, especially that of giving voice to the voiceless. As Paul once said, "Woe to me if I don't preach the Gospel!" (1 Cor 9:16)

God's Image and Likeness

Our faith informs us that no human being in this world deserves to be treated as a "non-human", not even the mentally ill, or those born with disabilities. This is consistent with our defense of the right to life even of the unborn, because we believe that all human beings are creatures in God's image and likeness, imbued with an innate dignity. We also must consider the right to life of people who are brutally murdered just because they are suspected of being opponents of government, as well as those who are summarily executed by armed groups. Everyone in the civilized community of nations would agree that even those who may have committed criminal offenses should be treated in a humane way, even as justice demands that they be held accountable for their actions.

Save the Children

There is no way we can call ourselves a civilized society if we hold children in conflict with the law criminally liable. Children who get involved in crimes, such as those who are used as runners by adult drug pushers, do not deserve to be treated as criminals; they are victims that need to be rescued. It is obvious that most children in conflict with the law come from very poor families and were born and raised in an environment of abuse. We beg our country's legislators to give the bills they are drafting some serious rethinking and consider the greater harm that such a move can cause on the young people of our country. We commend the initiatives to improve the Bahay-Pag-asa shelters for the care of children in conflict with the law.

The Perspective of Mercy

Being civilized is not just about more advanced technology and infrastructure but about being more humane to the poor, the weak, the disadvantaged, the elderly, the children, those with special needs and all those who tend to be left out in society. We are not just creatures endowed with intelligence and guided by the evolutionary instincts of "survival of the fittest". What makes us more superior as creatures is not our impulse to dominate each other but our innate sensitivity and capacity to love, to respect, to care for one another, to be both just and merciful, to be compassionate, to build community and to be genuinely concerned about the common good. The law of retaliation that demands "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" (Exodus 21:24) has long been repudiated in Christian tradition. As Christians, we have to learn the way of Jesus who says, "Be merciful, just as [also] your Father is merciful."(Luke 6:36)

Conquering Evil with Good

More than ever, as members of the Church, we must realize that our strength lies in keeping our communities of faith intact. We must educate the faithful in the application of their conscience to the complex and myriad problems of life — in the choice of leaders, in the exercise of their vocation as citizens, in the raising of families, in their work and chosen professions, in the efforts to care for the environment, etc. Our faith must try to hold these different aspects of life together into an integral whole — letting conscience speak its wisdom consistently in every aspect of our life.

Finally, we reiterate what we said in the previous statement that "the battles that we fight are spiritual." (Ephesians 6:10-17). In the midst of spiritual warfare, St. Peter admonishes us to "be sober and alert" especially when the enemy attacks "like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour." (1 Peter 5:8) As members of God's flock, we must learn to be brave, to stick together, and look after one another. Let this moment be a time to pray, to be strong, wise, and committed. Let this be also a teaching moment for us all—a moment for relearning the core beliefs, principles and values of our faith, and what it means to be a Catholic Christian at this time.
